





Albert Raymond Bazinet passed away on October 2, 2025, at the age of 61. He will be lovingly missed by his wife of 37 years, Shirley Swan, his mother Helen Bazinet, his six siblings, and many nieces and nephews. Albert was predeceased by his father, Victor Bazinet.

Albert was born in Eriksdale, Manitoba, where he lived and worked on the family farm alongside his parents and siblings. Growing up in a close-knit rural community shaped his lifelong values of hard work, kindness, and friendship. Albert met Shirley in the spring of 1988, and together they built a life filled with love, laughter, and adventure. They especially cherished camping, spending countless weekends exploring the outdoors and sharing quiet moments by the fire.

Albert was a dedicated and hardworking member of Manitoba's agricultural community. He worked on numerous dairy farms and with both Alta Genetics and Lactanet. His career took him across the province as he became highly respected within the dairy and beef industries. Albert went the "extra mile" to ensure everything he did had the best possible results, either with milk recording, registrations, or communicating with breed associations on behalf of his herds.

Known for his friendly nature and love of conversation, Albert enjoyed talking with people wherever he went—whether he knew them or not—and could always find common ground and good humour in every exchange. If you mentioned the name Bazinet anywhere, someone in the group would invariably ask, "Do you know Albert?"

Albert's greatest passion was curling. He made a lasting impact on junior curling in Manitoba, coaching over 24 teams during his 20-year tenure. His experience and love for the sport were evident in his coaching and in the many relationships he built within his broad curling family.

Whether he was at the rink or in a dairy barn, he was never shy about sharing his thoughts, happy to offer friendly coaching and encouragement to curlers or his farm customers.


John dedicated his life to working on the farm, spending long hours alongside his loved ones. He continued farming until November 2022, when a massive stroke forced John to step away from the farm he cherished so deeply.

John and his family were dedicated breeders of high-quality, purebred cattle, initially using the 'IS' prefix before establishing the 'STEFHAVEN' name. John proudly exhibited his prized animals at fairs throughout Manitoba and across Western Canada. He valued the friendships he formed within the dairy community, and people knew when John set his sights on a particular cow, he would bring it home.

John's keen eye earned him recognition as an official judge with Holstein Canada, and he shared his enthusiasm for breeding and exhibiting cattle with his daughters and grandson, Bradley Bazinet (BRANET), inspiring the next generation to continue his legacy.

In 1999, after a devastating barn fire claimed most of the herd, John was determined to rebuild what was lost. He insisted, "There is a hole in the yard," and soon replaced the barn with a new freestall facility, rebuilding the herd from the ground up. In 2015, John and Victoire sold the farm to Bradley, yet he continued to grain farm over 1,000 acres and was always eager to lend a hand.

John's devotion to his family was evident in everything he did. He found great joy in visits from his great-grandchildren, his face lighting up whenever they arrived. One of his favorite pastimes was playing bingo at Kin Place, where winners could select a chocolate treat or toy as a prize. True to his generous spirit, John always chose stuffed toys to delight his great-grandchildren.
